The Witch-hunt in Early Modern Europe

Course Description

The course is an upper division history elective for majors and non-majors. Through the study of the historical phenomenon of witch-hunting in early modern Europe, students will become familiar with various approaches to historical study including anthropology, gender, law, and microhistory. Students will produce a substantial research paper, and will work with the professor individually in the research and revising stages. In the last weeks of class, students will synthesize their understanding of the social and legal elements of witch-hunting and witch-trials by staging their own mock witch trial.
